We no longer inhabit a world governed by international coordination, a unified NATO bloc, or an American hegemon.

Traditionally, the decline of one empire leads to a restoration in the balance of power, via a struggle among rival systems of order. Yet this dynamic is surprisingly absent today; instead, the superpowers have all, at times, sought to promote what Jason Pack terms the 'Enduring Disorder'. While issues such as religion, homosexuality, sexual conduct, and abortion have figured prominently

in public discussion, in fact there is no single thread that unifies responses to each of these cultural dilemmas for any of the writers.
