The island is nearly circular, with an average diameter of 8 km, and covers an area of approximately 42 km<sup>2</sup>. It lies above a base of Mesozoic limestone and a thin crust, with the mantle-crust transition located at a depth of approximately 27 km. The volcanic edifice of Nisyros comprises a succession of calc-alkaline lavas and pyroclastic rocks, as well as a summit caldera with an average diameter of 4 km. Several of Iran's allies have conducted acts of international terrorism, and each annual State Department report on international terrorism since the early 1990s has*

*described Iran as the "leading" or "most active" state sponsor of terrorism. Israeli leaders identify Iran's significant presence in Syria as a growing-and unacceptable-threat to Israel's security. The Trump Administration has cited Iran's regional "malign activities" and repeated ballistic missile tests to assert that "Iran's provocative actions threaten the United States, [and] the [Middle East] region," and that the JCPOA has failed to address Iran's objectionable behavior beyond its nuclear program. It was partly on these grounds that President Trump withdrew the United States from the JCPOA on May 8, 2018, and announced that all U.S. sanctions would be reimposed. Although the Administration has articulated an overall strategy for Iran that includes rolling back its regional influence, neither the President nor Secretary of State Mike Pompeo has announced specific new steps or committed additional U.S. resources to accomplish that objective.
