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In the emerging new collaborative economic order, innovation is achieved by an integrated process of

collaboration between policymakers, business and society. Often, the focus for this collaboration is at a regional level. *Creating Collaborative Advantage* examines the trends in innovation policy that reflect this new thinking and regional focus. This unique perspective on the academia-society nexus is essential reading for academics and students interested in the ongoing debate on the role of academia in policy, particularly those policies dealing with issues of social justice and social change. The United States is among the wealthiest nations in the world, but it is far from the healthiest. Although life expectancy and survival rates in the United States have improved dramatically over the past century, Americans live shorter lives and experience more injuries and illnesses than people in other high-income countries. The U.S. health disadvantage cannot be attributed solely to the adverse health status of racial or ethnic minorities or poor people: even



highly advantaged Americans are in worse health than their counterparts in other, "peer" countries. In light of the new and growing evidence about the U.S. health disadvantage, the National Institutes of Health asked the National Research Council (NRC) and the Institute of Medicine (IOM) to convene a panel of experts to study the issue. The Panel on Understanding Cross-National Health Differences Among High-Income Countries examined whether the U.S. health disadvantage exists across the life span, considered potential explanations, and assessed the larger implications of the findings. U.S. Health in International Perspective presents detailed evidence on the issue, explores the possible explanations for the shorter and less healthy lives of Americans than those of people in comparable countries, and recommends actions by both government and nongovernment agencies and organizations to address the U.S. health disadvantage. This volume explores the scientific frontiers and leading edges of research across the fields of anthropology, economics, political science, psychology, sociology, history, business, education, geography, law, and psychiatry, as well as the newer, more specialized areas of artificial intelligence, child development, cognitive science, communications, demography, linguistics, and management and decision science. It includes recommendations concerning new resources, facilities, and programs that may be needed over the next several years to ensure rapid progress and provide a high level of returns to basic research. Current literature on empathy tends to focus on the role of the caregiver in the provision of social support. However, this study focused on the impact of the type of social support

the recipient receives (distraction, person-focused empathy, relationship-focused empathy), on negative emotions, cognitive assessment of the caregiver and future implications of the recipient's relationship with the caregiver. Two individual differences were hypothesized to moderate the impact of the different types of social support, these were gender and response style. One hundred and eighty-five undergraduate students at Singapore Management University were asked to imagine themselves in two consecutive relationship problem scenarios, the first based on family issues, the second on friendship. Before the manipulation was administered, they were asked to report their affect levels on the emotion scale. They were then shown either one of three social support responses (distraction, person-focused empathy, relationship-focused empathy), from their caregiver-friend. Participants were then asked to report their affect levels again, and to rate their cognitive assessment of their caregiver-friend and the future implications of their relationship with that friend. Results indicated that distraction tended to decrease participants' negative emotions significantly from pre-test to posttest, while relationship-focused empathy tended to invoke guilt in participants. An elaboration of the role of guilt in relationship reparation was included. One of the most complete sources of information on the development of social skills training with youth, this useful volume integrates current research and practice. Practitioners interested in establishing or revising current social service delivery programs for children and adolescents will discover valuable conceptual and programmatic ideas. There is a long tradition of theory and research on emotions

and social processes conducted within a biological framework. Emotions and social processes are intimately related, since emotions are a central feature of social interaction.
