*Examining the Relationship Between Clinical Practice Guidelines and Hospital Efficiency* Feb 23 2020 Efficiency of care is an important topic in Canadian health care. One common measure of efficiency is length of stay (LOS) (Murphy & Noetscher, 1999; Needham et al., 2003; Brownell & Roos, 1995). Clinical practice guidelines (CPGs)---"systematically developed statements to assist practitioner and patient decisions about appropriate health care for specific clinical circumstances" (Field & Lohr, 1990 p.38)---are an intervention used to reduce LOS. The current research addresses the question, what is the overall relationship between the use of CPGs and hospital efficiency, as measured by LOS? This thesis includes three chapters that explore this relationship. Chapter 2 discusses a systematic review that the researcher conducted to test the nature of the CPG-LOS relationship. One hundred seventy-three studies were included in the review and encompassed a wide array of disease states. The review found a statistically significant association between the use of CPGs and reduced LOS. However, the quality rating of the studies found that, for the most part, they had limitations, regardless of year of publication. A limited number of the studies included were conducted on more than one CPG, in more than one hospital, or in Canada. Therefore, Chapter 3 of this thesis adds to the literature by addressing all those issues. Chapter 3 discusses a secondary data analysis including data on more than 80 hospitals in numerous medical and surgical clinical areas. Only two significant relationships were discovered, one involving pneumonia and one involving prostatectomy. On the whole, there were no significant differences between CPG usage or efficiency over the two-year period. Possible reasons for these results are provided in the discussion. Considering the contradictory results found in Chapters 2 and 3, the researcher conducted qualitative interviews in a sample of Ontario hospitals to explore factors that could influence the relationship between the use of CPGs and LOS. Nine interviews were conducted, and five main factors---outlined in Chapter 4---were found, including the purpose of the implementation and the clinicians' response. Finally, Chapter 5 discusses the findings of the three research

chapters, develops potential implications, and provides directions for future research.

It makes the case for outcomes research in determining what works in health care and policy reforms to rationalize how care is delivered. Each chapter synthesizes the current published literature in the field and covers a description of medical practice variations in the area, determinants of these variations and outcomes. It outlines the most

current research on specific types of utilization such as inpatient care, emergency services, elective surgery, primary care, obstetric and gynaecological care, mental health care and end-of-life care, among others. Studies of variation in condition-specific care focus on common conditions such as acute myocardial infarction, congestive heart failure, stroke, diabetes and procedures such as cancer surgery and joint replacement. Special topics include health care spending and quality, shared decision making and disparities.

The Natural State of Medical Practice - Mar 06 2021 In this first volume of a three-volume work, a search for the foundation of authentic medical practice is undertaken by Dr. Adams prompted by a forty-year career in clinical medicine. After an analysis of primitive cultures, seven ancient civilizations, and modern Western medicine, only the medicine of Classical Greece and the modern West has approached what can be called a "natural state of medical practice," defined as "effective medical care effectively delivered free from external forces." In each case this was accomplished within two or three centuries. The absence of medical progress in primitive societies and its failure to mature in the ancient civilizations of Mesopotamia, Egypt, India, China, and the Americas is shown to be the consequence of authoritarianism. In contrast, the medical progress of ancient Greece and especially the modern West, which owes nothing whatever to prior civilizations, is explained solely by collegial exchange, within a free citizenry, of information and scientific analysis by a network of autonomous medical practitioners motivated by self-interest. It is argued that clinical care approximating that of the early 20th C might have been achieved by the time of Christ had not Hippocratic medicine prematurely ceased to exist. Extinct in the Dark Ages, medical progress in the West began anew in the 18th C, again with no obligation to prior civilizations, not even to Hippocratic medicine or to the Renaissance, but again the consequence of collegial sharing of knowledge by autonomous medical practitioners, now made more efficient via medical journals. After analyzing the failure

of ancient medical practices to mature, Dr. Adams proposes an Isagorical Theory of Human Progress that identifies the toxic role of authoritarianism on human freedom. He concludes with a warning that recent infringements of the Hippocratic Oath presage another dire authoritarian blight infecting the medical profession. William H. Adams, MD, FACP, DCMT(London), now retired after forty years of medical practice primarily at large municipal hospitals in New York City and Boston, began his inquiry into what constitutes a proper medical practice because of unsatisfactory features of modern medicine. As an internist with the subspecialty of hematology and with clinical credentials in tropical medicine, his efforts began with the translation of Hippocratic medical treatises most closely aligned with internal medicine. But, as he reviewed ancient medical practices around the world, sociopolitical patterns affecting medical practice emerged that extended the breadth of his studies, ultimately to include even prehistoric civilizations. The conclusions of twenty years of attention to his topic are detailed in three volumes entitled "The Natural State of Medical Practice," and, encompassing areas unintended at the beginning, reveal a new theory of human progress with implications far beyond medical practice.
